Course Structure with Distribution of Marks

Course Objectives: Philosophy, as a field of study, is crucial in such a context since it can help:

To equip pupils with the ability to observe and grasp the reality in a sensible and logical manner.

To Understand and respect the complexities and differences of Indian Philosophy. Foster and encourage a rational and logical approach to people.

Duration of the Course:

The course M.A. (Philosophy) shall consist of two academic years divided into four semesters.

Structure of the Programme:

The M.A in Philosophy programme consists of:

- (i) Core courses of theory are compulsory for all students. In SEMESTER I , SEMESTER II, SEMESTER III and SEMESTER IV.
- (ii)In Elective courses students have to choose any three papers in **SEMESTER III and SEMESTER IV** of the six papers.

Scheme of Examinations:

The examination shall be divided into two parts in which first part is continuous assessment or internal assessment and second part is semester assessment or external assessment. The schemes for the internal and external examinations shall be as under:

- A) THE ASSESSMENT OF THE STUDENT FOR THEORY PAPER SHALL BE DIVIDED INTO TWO PARTS IN WHICH FIRST PART IS CONTINUOUS ASSESSMENT OR INTERNAL ASSESSMENT (33.33% OF MAXIMUM MARKS) AND SECOND PART IS SEMESTER ASSESSMENT OR EXTERNAL ASSESSMENT (66.66% OF MAXIMUM MARKS).
- b) The internal assessment (IA) for each theory paper shall be done by the teacher concerned and she/he will maintain all concerned records in the Department. Internal Assessments for each paper during every semester will be conducted in the following manner:

c) A student who remains absent (defaulter) or fails or wants to improve the marks in the internal assessment may be permitted to appear in the desired paper(s) (only one time) in the same semester with the permission of the concerned Head of the

Department. A defaulter / improvement fee of Rupees 200/- per paper shall be charged from such candidates. Duly forwarded application of such candidates by the teacher concerned shall be submitted to HOD who may permit the candidate to appear in the internal assessment after depositing the defaulter/ improvement fee. A record of such candidates shall be kept in the Department.

- d) The external assessment shall be of three hours duration for each theory paper.
- e) The syllabus for each theory paper is divided into five independent units and each theory question paper will be divided into three sections as mentioned below:
 - Section-A shall have 01 compulsory question comprising 10 questions (maximum 20 words answer) taking two questions from each unit. Each question shall be of two mark and total marks of this section will be 20. This section will be compulsory in the paper.
 - Section-B will carry 80 marks equally divided into five long answer type questions (answer about in 500 words) and examiners are advised to set two questions from each unit and students are instructed to attempt five questions by selecting one question from each unit.
